1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

(i) Planning The curriculum planning is initiated by following the Academic Calendar issued by Dibrugarh University for the affiliated colleges. The Academic Development Committee incorporating the Principal, Heads of Departments and all Faculty members of the college holds a meeting at the beginning of every session and discusses the various aspects of curriculum planning and implementation. It is also entrusted with the task of forming the Routine Development Committee. (ii) Implementation The Routine Development Committee formed by the Academic Development Committee prepares a general routine. The routine includes classes for the three streams including remedial classes, sports etc. The departments, too, hold meeting to discuss the preparation of departmental routine, allotment of classes to teachers, course distribution etc. Accordingly, the departmental routines are prepared, course is distributed and classes allotted to teachers. An Induction programme, both

general and department wise, is held for the newly admitted students to acquaint them with the course curriculum, examination pattern etc. In respect of course delivery, teachers make use of ICT, conduct group discussions and seminars, hold internal semester examinations, class tests etc. Moreover, certain bridge courses in subjects like Assamese, English, Economics etc. are conducted to enhance and develop the skills of students in creative writing, communication skill, mathematical economics among others. Further, the college takes the initiative of taking feedback from students regarding the curriculum and accordingly, a joint meeting of authority and IQAC is held to address the grievances and offer solutions.

Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities –laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. The college has drawn up a list of procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. Laboratories: Each laboratory has dedicated lab assistants and attendants for regular maintenance of laboratory equipments and stock keeping of chemicals and materials on regular basis, proper documentation of equipments purchased, repairs undertaken, replacements etc. The staff are trained in proper use and handling of equipment and are responsible to keep the laboratories clean and in order. Library: The library development is done by the Library Advisory Committee. The library has an experienced and knowledgeable library staff with required qualification. Books, journals and magazines etc. are purchased in consultation with teachers and staff members, under the supervision of the library advisory committee. The library staff are trained in systematically arranging or shelving books, periodicals etc., displaying new books on the display racks, dusting and cleaning of the shelves and books at regular intervals, proper cataloguing through library database. There is facility of mending and rebinding of old and worn out books, imposing fine for late return of books, maintenance of register of visitors to the library, managing or overseeing of the collection by the librarian, subscription of new journals, newspapers after consultation with the faculty and Principal. If books issued to a member are found mutilated at the time of return, he/ she needs to replace the same or pay the price thereof. All students of the college are members of the college library by virtue of the library fees they pay at the time of admission. Every student using the library is provided bar-code generated Library Identity Card. Library provides two books on loan to each member student of HS and Degree



(Core) students and three books to each Degree (Major) students. Book Bank facility is provided to the poor meritorious students. In this service the library provides 04 (four) books for a period of one month to the selected poor meritorious students. Sports Complex: The college has a well-resourced gymnasium for the students and the staff. It has all the modern amenities including equipments like dumbbells, barbells, treadmill etc. for an effective workout. The indoor stadium is periodically inspected for carrying out cleaning, repairs and maintenance. Care is taken to provide proper lighting facility. The students and faculty visit the stadium on a daily basis for practice. The college has a lush green playground of 5000 square feet area. Various sports and outdoor games like football, volleyball, cricket etc., are conducted time to time here. The open field is regularly mowed in order to hold various sporting events of the college as well as external events. The college has a Badminton Coaching Centre whose activities are supervised by a managing committee. The coaching is imparted by qualified and experienced coaches. Besides, there is a volleyball court in the college which is also maintained and supervised regularly. Computers: The computers and internet resources and other facilities in the college campus are provided through the College Computer Centre. It is responsible for maintenance, repair and upgradation of the computers and other items of Information Technology. The purchase of required computers is done by the Purchase Committee after due approval of the Principal of the college. The departments of the college are provided with internet and Wi-fi facility. Classrooms: The regular cleaning and maintenance of classrooms are done by the fourth grade workers and sweepers. Besides, students, too undertake cleanliness drive. The office of the Principal ensures the provision of sufficient benches, desks, equipments like blackboards, lighting facility along with necessary repairs that have to be undertaken from time to time. Student Support and Welfare: The college has constituted various sub-committees to extend support for students and work for their welfare such as Students' Welfare Committee to look after students' affairs, Grievance and Redressal Cell to address the grievances of students, ST/SC/Minority committee for the welfare of the minority committees, hostel committee to look after the affairs of the hostel such as the administration of the hostel and supervision of the boarders. The National Service Scheme in the College has helped the students in many ways. By adopting this scheme the College has been able to create awareness among the students to develop a sense of responsibility and to redefine their personality through community service. Free Medical camps are organized by the College from time to time with the help of reputed Medical Practitioners. These camps are open for the students, staff and for the people of the neighboring locality. A number of scholarships and fellowships have been initiated by the college itself to support students in their learning. Academic Support: The college provides academic support by various means such as holding of that semester wise remedial classes for slow learners and special classes (such as Coaching for competitive examinations, project work etc.) for the advanced learners. It also has the facility of teacher exchange programme.

Human Resource Management

For continuous development of the human resources, the college organizes capacity building programmes, seminars, popular talk workshops etc. in different areas for the faculty member, nonteaching staff and students. Moreover, the college authority always encourages the faculty members to participate in different faculty development programmes, training and seminars in other educational institutions. The NSS Unit of the college also organizes various workshop/training programmes with the active involvement of the student volunteers with a view to enhance their leadership capacity. The college organizes professional development training for laboratory bearers every year. The college has different information sources for the students like Magazines and Journals of different thrust areas of importance, every department of the college have annual magazines and Wall magazines to showcase the talents of the students. Sports are considered as one of the important components of human resource development. Therefore, the college has taken different initiatives to popularize sports among students as a part of its academic curriculum. The college organizes College week every year, provide finance to students to participate in a different district, state, national and international level sports and cultural events. The college has also well designed and sophisticated three Badminton courts and a Gymnasium. The college has a 900 square meter size of a sports field for outdoor games.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The college has a good collection of textbooks, reference books, journals, magazines, periodicals, newspapers in its Central Library. It has 20871

textbooks, 11368 reference books, 56 journals/magazine/periodicals, and 137 resources in CD/Video format. The college library has a subscription of N-List Resources from which the faculty members can access all e-books and e-journals. The college library also develops two digital databases for the benefit of the students and teachers. The college library is partially automated with KOHA SOUL software. The Library has also a computer centre with an internet facility for the benefit of students as well as the faculty members.

Research and Development

The IQAC has a Research Committee which disseminates necessary information regarding research projects and funding agencies. Young Teachers are encouraged by the committee to take up projects, publish papers in UGC Care listed journals. Two young faculty members of the college have been awarded major and minor research projects from ICSSR and ICHR respectively in the 2019-20 session. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Gargaon College is taking various initiatives to make its campus eco-friendly. All the stakeholders of the college follow the policy of reduce, recycle and reuse in general to realize this goal.

- 1. Sustainable Landscape, Green and Clean Campus:** The College campuses are located amidst a serene natural environment and all members of the teaching and non-teaching staff along with students are dedicated to maintaining its greenery and cleanliness. The campuses are covered with a mix of old and young trees, ornamental shrubs, and herbs (medicinal). Planting of trees is a regular feature of the college and every year sites are identified for plantation. Further, the college authority selects sites every year so as to make the entire campus green. Regular cleanliness drives are undertaken by the NSS volunteers, students and teachers of all the departments.
- 2. Energy Conservation:** All the lights of the college have been changed to Light Emitting Diodes (LEDs) bulbs and tube sets (40 watts). The faculty members, administrative staff and students are sensitized to use electric power judiciously. All buildings and the newly constructed buildings in the campus have been constructed with more provision of natural light and ventilation, enabling lower consumption of electrical energy in day time. The street light of the college campus at night runs on solar energy with lower consumption of electrical energy at night also.
- 3. Use of Alternate sources of energy:** To promote the use of renewable energy, energy-efficient fixtures like solar street lights are installed throughout the college campus. Gargaon College plans to expand the use of solar energy all over the campus with the various funding agency.
- 4. Waste Management:** Waste or unwanted or unusable materials are part and parcel of the college campus, which harm the earth's soil and atmosphere. Keeping this in mind, the waste material in college is segregated into biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes, and as toxic and non-toxic wastes in the laboratories. Indiscriminate use of chemicals and plastic is discouraged during practical classes and moreover, the college does not use any radioactive substances in their laboratories. The College maintains its entire computer and other electronic items within its boundaries. The college is proposing to collaborate with the NGO and other government-registered firms for managing the e-waste. The College has tied up with local vendors for waste paper and plastics 'Recycling Services' for managing its paper and plastic waste. All the used paper and plastics of college is sent to them for recycling into useful. The canteen and garden waste is also managed by converting it into manure.
- 5. Awareness Programme:** Regular programs for generating environmental and social issues among students and staff members through competitions, students' seminars, group activities, exhibitions and conferences, workshops, rallies and training to address diverse issues from time to time.



## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

**Best Practices 2018-19 Practice: I** Name of the Practice: Remedial Classes for Slow Learners Objectives: 1. To provide motivation and enhance the skills of the slow learners in different areas related to the syllabus, classes, computer knowledge, participation in college activities and sports etc. 2. To provide support to the students belonging to the vulnerable sections of the society. 3.

To emphasize on the incubation of the students. The context It has been observed that since the last two years a section of students have not performed well in various fields related to academics, sports, competitive examinations etc. Realizing the seriousness of the issue, the Academic Development Committee along with the college administration decided to undertake various programs to promote overall development of the slow learners. This involves organization of remedial classes by the respective departments, provision of basic computer knowledge and various other sports and incubation related trainings to the slow learners, especially those belonging to the vulnerable section of the society.

**Practice Under** this program, the respective departments of the college identify the slow learners on the basis of their performance in the in-semester and end-semester examinations. After identification of the slow learners, the respective departments are entrusted the responsibility of organizing remedial classes on various syllabus related contents. A proper routine and detailed register is maintained for this purpose. The college also has a well equipped computer centre in the college campus through which the slow learners are provided with the basic computer and sports related trainings. Various

Committees under the IQAC also undertake different remedial programs for the upliftment of the slow learners, especially those belonging to the vulnerable section of the society. Impact of the Practice More than 800 students have been benefited from the various remedial practices undertaken by the respective departments. This practice has been helpful for the slow learners in the improving their in-semester and end-semester results. The special schemes undertaken by the various Committees under the IQAC for overall development of the vulnerable section has led to the promotion of inclusiveness among the students. Problems It has been seen that after continuous efforts on part of

the administration, many students were ignorant about the seriousness of the remedial classes and self-excluded themselves from attending those classes. Moreover the remedial classes have increased the workload of the teachers.

**Practice-II** Name of the Practice: Scholarship and financial aid programme Objectives: i) To provide financial support to the poor students for higher education. ii) To facilitate scholarship to the meritorious students. The context: The college is situated in the rural areas of Sivasagar district. Most of the students of the college come from poor economic background. Many poor students after graduating from the college find it difficult to enroll themselves in different higher educational institutions for further. To

encourage the economically weak meritorious students, a few scholarships and financial aids have been introduced by the college. Moreover, the college has formed a welfare fund for the students to support different academic aspects of those students. These type of practices motivate them to perform well in academics. The Practice The college invites applications from the students for different scholarships once in a year. The college has a standard procedure of selecting the applicants. Family income less than Rs. 2 lakhs per annum, percentage secured by the students in the last semester examination are some important criterion of selection for these scholarships. The committee constituted by the College authority verifies the applications and take

appropriate actions for granting the scholarships. In addition to this with the aim of promoting students welfare, the college provides financial assistance to the students for treatment of some critical illness, accidents etc. Impact of the Practice In the last three years, more than 150 students have been

benefited from these schemes and around 20 students have got benefited from the financial assistance provided by the college. Problem The large numbers of applicants in relation to the limited resources of the corpus fund make it difficult for the college administration to provide the scholarships and/or aid to all.
